

Freedom and Democracy Day

November 17 is particularly important in the Czech Republic, and this year even more so. 80 years ago, in 1939, the Nazi's stormed Czech universities, executed nine Czech students and professors and 1,200 were sent to concentration camps. These actions lead this day to be known around the world as International Students' Day. On the 50th anniversary of this event, in 1989, a student demonstration was suppressed by riot police. The 1989 demonstrations lead to what is now known as the Velvet Revolution, and the fall of the communist regime in Czechoslovakia. Every year, there are commemorations for each of these events across the republic. In Brno there is traditionally a Lantern Parade through Brno to light candles in memorial.

WINTER BREAK - IMPORTANT INFO

December 21-January 3

Due to the delayed start of the semester, classes will resume after the winter break, so students should keep this in mind when making holiday plans.

The Czech Government has reinstated the rule, starting Nov. 9 that students entering the Czech Republic from 'red' countries must produce a negative test. You can find the current regulations on our website under 'conditions for entry', these current regulations will be updated on Nov. 9 when they will become valid, and on the Ministry of Interior's website.

For students who may travel home for the holidays, please keep this in mind if you plan to return to Brno.

They may not speak English when you go there, however there is an online form you can complete tp schedule an appointment. e. Please note that this test is only to see if you currently have Coronavirus, it DOES NOT test antibodies.

CORONAVIRUS UPDATE

State of Emergency extended to Nov. 20 (may be extended)

The Czech Government has created a <u>Covid Portal</u> in English that we encourage students to look at and us. Governmental Regulations

- Facemasks are required in all public transport and indoors.
- · Free movement of people is banned
 - There are several exceptions to this ban, in particular for trips to work and in connection with business, for trips to see family, for the purchase of basic necessities, for trips to health-care facilities and travel to education and examinations. People can go out to parks, into nature.
 - With the exception of members of a household, only two people are able to move about together in public places.
 - A curfew is now in place from 9 p.m until 5 a.m. There are exceptions for people travelling to work or seeking urgent medical care.
- Shops and services are closed. Exceptions include, for example, the sale of food, drugstore items, pharmacies, and florists.
- Shops must close at 8 p.m. and may not open at all on Sundays. Marketplaces are also closed with the exception of farmers' markets.

University and FSS Regulations

- The presence of students at universities is prohibited, with the exception of clinical and practical teaching and internships of students in the study programmes of general medicine, dentistry, pharmacy and other healthcare study programmes.
- All students at higher education institutions must wear facemasks in schools, including classes.
- Universities can hold exams where there are no more than 10 people.
- The FSS library is open to pick up and drop off books only.
- If students need to meet with Klára, Dagmar, or Ludmila it must be arranged beforehand.

REPORTING POSITIVE TEST RESULTS

Informing MUNI of positive coronavirus results

Anyone who tests positive for coronavirus will be contacted by the Hygienic Department with the phone number you provided. Please do not change phone numbers if you are waiting for results.

If students test positive for Coronavirus they must do the following.

- 1. Report your positive test in IS System.
- 2. Contact your study department and the IRO office at FSS that you have tested positive.

If you live in the university dormitories, the dormitories will be alerted by the FSS IRO office that you have tested positive and they will contact you if new arrangements need to be made.
